

Great Lakes USA is a collection of eight beautiful and unique states, each with so much to offer travellers from all around the globe. Whether you're looking for a fly/drive outdoor adventure, a luxurious cruise or something completely off the beaten path, you'll find it in this magical region.

While every state is different, there is one natural gem that connects us all: water. The great lakes.

These five lakes collectively span 246,463 square kilometres, making it the largest body of fresh water on the planet. And these aren't just any lakes. These are lakes that feel more like oceans. Ones that breathe life into the region, offering new worlds to explore.

In **Illinois**, you have the great city of Chicago overlooking the beautiful shore of Lake Michigan. The rest of Illinois features a multitude of gorgeous settings to lose yourself in, including over 60 state parks to enjoy the wonder of every season.

Indiana's 20+ state parks each offer their own unique landscape, from sand dunes to canyons, caves and especially the majestic waterfalls of the state's crown jewel, Turkey Run State Park.

Michigan boasts three national forests, two national parks, two national lakeshores, and 100 state parks, including Isle Royale, the least visited national park in all of the United States.

Minnesota, the land of 10,000 lakes, gives new meaning to the great outdoors with its plethora of pristine bodies of water and natural sites that invite adventurers into the wilderness.

The northern part of **Ohio** stretches along the coast of Lake Erie, and about 60 minutes west of Cleveland you

can ferry across the lake to Put-in-Bay on South Bass Island. Often called the "Key West of the North," Put-in-Bay is known for lively entertainment, historic sites and breathtaking water views.

Pennsylvania features the old-growth hemlocks of the North, the rolling countryside of the South, millions of acres of public land and the fabled city of Philadelphia, where visitors will find a trove of American history sites.

In **New York** more amazing water views can be found in the great city of Buffalo which sits on the eastern end of Lake Erie. Here, you'll find a remarkable arts, music and architecture scene filled with good food and friendly people.

When you visit **Wisconsin**, you're entering "America's Playground." It's surrounded by water on three sides and over half the state is forested, allowing you to get the absolute most out of outdoor activities.

unique geological formations.

Get off the grid exploring the limestone caves of Mississippi Palisades State Park, the waterfalls and canyons of Starved Rock State Park, and the mesmerising sandstone bluffs of Giant City State Park. Garden of the Gods in Shawnee National Forest offers the most unforgettable escape into nature with breathtaking bluffs and 300-million-year-old rock formations for the photo opportunity of a lifetime.

Classic Beef at the Original Mr. Beef – The restaurant that inspired the hit show "The Bear," this Chicago River North street food stand has been serving cult-favourite Italian beef sandwiches for decades. Each takes 3-4 days to make, with drippings used for gravy au jus. You can have it wet, dry, or dipped.

Deep Dish Pizza – Thick pizza baked in a pan and layered with cheese, fillings, and tomato sauce. Many think Chicago-style pizza is more akin to a pie than a traditional New York slice, but the local delicacy is a must when in the Windy City. Who serves up the best slice is a hotly debated topic, but one local favourite is Pequod's, also featured on "The Bear" and beloved for its caramelised crust.

Horseshoe Sandwich – An open-faced "sandwich" originating in Springfield, this carb lover's dream features thick slices of Texas toast piled high with meat, French fries, and cheese sauce, best experienced at Motorhead's Bar & Grill on Route 66.





Gemini Giant, Wilmington – Snap a photo with this iconic landmark statue on Route 66. Named after the Gemini space programme, it holds a rocket in its hand and is part of the Muffler Man series found across the US from the early days of advertising.

Big Things, Small Town – Visitors are drawn to Casey in southeastern Illinois for its larger-than-life roadside attractions and small-town charm. Home to 12 of the "world's largest" items, from wooden shoes to rocking chairs, other bizarre "big things" on display include ears of corn and pencils.

Pink Elephant Antique Mall, Livingston - A

30,000-square-foot antique shopping mall, '50s diner, candy shop, and ice cream parlour along Route 66, the Pink Elephant offers floor-to-ceiling deals and steals, along with quirky photo ops for the whole family.

Zip Through the Treetops

With picturesque hills, lush woodlands, and over 400 miles of hiking trails, there's no better place to get fresh air than Shawnee National Forest in Southern Illinois. For an adrenaline-filled adventure, soar through the forest canopy on a zipline tour that zigzags through the bluffs and valleys.




Take an Aerial Challenge

For adventure enthusiasts, The Forge: Lemont Quarries is a must-visit in close proximity to Chicago. Stretching across 300 acres, this unique adventure park features an aerial challenge course, climbing towers, ziplines, and a kids' zone. You can also enjoy mountain biking, rock climbing, or spend some time on the water with a kayak, canoe, or paddleboat.

There is no American road trip more iconic than Route 66, aka the "Mother Road," a journey that gives travellers the true essence of a quintessential road trip. And it all starts in the incredible city of Chicago. The road stretches down the state of Illinois, weaving through unique towns with delicious restaurants, past expansive landscapes and gorgeous state parks, and into attractions and history itself. We've gathered some of the best highlights along the road so you don't miss a thing while planning your ultimate Illinois Route 66 road trip.


No trip is complete without first spending time in one of the world's greatest cities. With towering skyscrapers overlooking the banks of **Lake Michigan**, first-time visitors will be blown away by the sheer scale of the freshwater "ocean" cradling the city. Snap a selfie of your reflection in the famous "Cloud Gate" sculpture, affectionately known as "**The Bean.**" Treat yourself to unbelievable 360° views of the city and beyond at the **Skydeck at Willis Tower** – you can see up to four states on a clear day. Don't miss dining at classic eateries like the **Billy Goat Tavern**, or grab a slice of Chicago's world-famous deep dish pizza at **Lou Malnati's**. You'll probably wish you had more time in Chicago, but the road is calling. Snap a picture at the original **Route 66 Begins sign** on E. Adams St, and get on your way!

As you leave Chicago behind, consider a stop at **Dell Rhea's Chicken Basket**, which has been serving up some of the best fried chicken on Route 66 since 1946. When you reach Joliet you can visit the **Old Joliet Prison**, a castle-like prison built in the 1850s. It housed some infamous American criminals, but perhaps the bigger notoriety is for the prison's role in American film and television, having been a filming location for both The Blues Brothers and Prison Break.

Pontiac is your next stop, and you'll find a treasure trove of Route 66 nostalgia and a larger-than-life mural which makes the perfect photo backdrop. Head to the **Pontiac-Oakland Automobile Museum** to see a variety of classic and antique cars. Don't miss the **Route 66 Hall of Fame and Museum**, home to thousands of artifacts and memorabilia associated with Route 66.

No trip through the Land of Lincoln would be complete without a healthy dose of Abraham Lincoln himself. Springfield, the capital of Illinois, is rich in American history and is home to several attractions dedicated to the nation's 16th president. Explore the Lincoln Home National Historic Site and pay your respects at Lincoln's Tomb, where you can rub his shiny golden nose for good luck. For the most in-depth look into the Lincoln's life, visit the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum. Famished? You'll find great eats at Route 66 Motorheads Bar, Grill, & Museum.









The last stretch of your journey is chock-full of stops. The **Original Historic Route 66 Brick Road** was laid down in 1931 and gives travellers a peek into what the entire road used to look like before modern concrete roads. Get refreshed at **Doc's Soda Fountain**, a pharmacy built in 1880 with food and ice cream treats.

In Livingston, you'll get the chance to browse through countless retro knick-knacks at the Pink Elephant Antique Mall. As you make your way to Collinsville, you can't miss the World's Largest Catsup Bottle, a 170 ft water tower in the shape of – you guessed it – a ketchup bottle. Then stop by the Cahokia Mounds State Historic Site, a UNESCO World Heritage Site and historical landmark. It's where you can find the remains of the most civilized prehistoric civilization north of Mexico. Conclude your journey with a scenic ride on the Grafton SkyTour.

The ride down Illinois Route 66 is a journey through time, capturing the essence of America's heartland. From the stunning lakefront of Chicago, to the historic depths of Springfield, to all the unique, off-the beaten attractions and landmarks, this iconic highway has many experiences that will make lasting memories.



natural beauty, adventure, and tranquility. Whether exploring rolling hills, serene lakes, dense forests, or winding rivers, Indiana's 20+ state parks provide unique landscapes and a variety of recreational activities.

For history enthusiasts, Spring Mill State Park features a restored grist mill and interpretive facilities showcasing Indiana's pioneer past. Enjoy a scenic horse-drawn carriage ride or visit Donaldson Cave, a hidden wonder with fascinating geological history. Cast a line at Patoka Lake or spend your days swimming, boating, or fishing for largemouth bass, catfish, and crappie. Discover the breathtaking waterfalls at Turkey Run State Park, Indiana's crown jewel, with its Instagram-worthy suspension bridge over cascading waters, deep gorges, and sandstone shelters. Marvel at the naturally formed wonders of Seven Pillars, find fossils at Falls of the Ohio State Park, see wild bison at Kankakee Sands, or follow the birding trail, where diverse habitats attract over 400 species of feathered friends.

Whether you choose to hike, bike, paddle, or picnic, Indiana's outdoors are ready to welcome you.



HE BEATEN PATH

Monastery of Immaculate Conception – Known as the "Castle on the Hill," this church is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. It's home to one of the nation's largest communities of Benedictine women and features an impressive Romanesque dome, religious iconography, and beautiful stained-glass windows.

Badlands Off-Road Park – Get your adrenaline pumping on over 800 acres of off-road trails for all levels. Rent or bring your own 4x4 vehicle or bring your own dirt bike, buggy or truck to traverse diverse terrain of sand dunes, mud, rocks, and streams on the trails and rock quarry.

The Covered Bridge Capital of the World – Parke County boasts 31 historic covered bridges across nine charming communities. Grab your keys, map, and camera, and plan your visit to these picturesque towns. Pro Tip: The Parke County Covered Bridge Festival in October is Indiana's largest annual event and a great time to visit.

Badlands Off-Road Park

The Children's Museum of Indianapolis – The world's largest children's museum and one of USA Today's Top 10 Children's Museums in America, this massive campus spans 29 acres with five floors of interactive fun, featuring exhibits like Barbie You Can Be Anything, Dinosphere, and the Riley Children's Health Sports Legend Experience.

Conner Prairie – Indiana's first Smithsonian-affiliated Museum, this living history museum offers 11 distinct historical areas with first-person interpretations of life throughout the 19th century from Indian Camp to Prairie Town.

Holiday World & Splashin' Safari – Located in Santa Claus, Indiana, this holiday-themed adventure and water park is one of the top 3 water parks in the country according to TripAdvisor.com. Don't miss the Voyage, the #1 wooden roller coaster according to *TIME* magazine, and Cheetah Chase, the world's first water coaster.

Explore One of the U.S.'s Newest National Parks

Millennia of wind and waves have shaped the land along 15 miles of Indiana coast at Indiana Dunes National and State Park, creating a rich mosaic of habitats. Explore over 50 miles of trails and immerse yourself in years of indigenous culture.



Sleep on the Water

Experience Indiana's first floating cabins at Patoka Lake, the state's secondlargest reservoir. With 8,800 acres of rolling topography and woodlands, it's especially beautiful in the fall and also offers traditional cabins and camping.



Rock On

Explore four caves with guided tours. Bluespring Caverns offers an underground boat ride along America's longest navigable underground river. Indiana Caverns, the state's longest cave, displays Ice Age animal bones. Marengo Cave is Indiana's most visited natural attraction, while Squire Boone Caverns is part of a pioneer village with hands-on arts and crafts.




With five national forests, six national park sites, two national lakeshores, and 100 state parks, Michigan caters to both thrill-seekers and those in search of tranquillity. It's a choose-your-own-adventure between remote wilderness or urban renewal; exhilarating dune buggy rides across the landscape or charming beach towns along the coast. However you choose to explore, be sure to stay long enough to get lost in the right direction.

Sweet Cherry Pie – Traverse City, known as the Cherry Capital of the World, is the largest producer of tart cherries in the US. Indulge in cherry-infused treats, from pies and jams to beverages and sauces, with the Very Cherry Passport, or visit a summer fruit market, stand, or u-pick farm during the July-August season.

Detroit Style Pizza – Detroit's square, Sicilian-style pizza has gained national acclaim, ranking the city among the top three pizza destinations in the US. What makes it so delicious? Generous layers of cheese melted atop thick, airy dough.

Pour One Out – Michigan offers plenty for foodies that pairs perfectly with a freshly brewed craft beer. Grand Rapids has earned the title "Beer City USA," with an Ale Trail featuring over 80 breweries. That's more craft beer per square mile than almost anywhere else on earth.





No Cars Allowed – Despite the state being most renowned for automobile production, one of the most popular vacation spots is Mackinac Island, which has been completely car-free since the 1800s. Voted the best summer travel destination in the US, you can explore the tiny island by horse and buggy, bike, scooter, or on foot after hopping on the ferry.

Holiday Cheer Throughout the Year – The world's largest Christmas store, Bronner's Christmas Wonderland, can be found in Michigan's little Bavaria, Frankenmuth. This enormous holiday hotspot, the size of 1.5 football fields, offers year-round festivities, including an illuminated Christmas Lane, Silent Night Chapel, and custom souvenir ornaments.

See Holland in Springtime – Holland, Michigan, celebrates its Dutch heritage each year with a Tulip Festival as a tribute to spring, when more than 5 million blooms colour the city. Regardless of when you visit, you can snap a selfie with the only authentic Dutch windmill in the US and tour the island gardens.

GREAT OUTDOORS:



Isle Royale National Park

One of the least visited national parks in America, this remote paradise in the heart of Lake Superior is accessible only by boat or seaplane from April through October. Favoured by those seeking a true backcountry experience off the grid, visitors tend to stay an average of 3.5 days, compared to the typical 4-hour visit to most national parks.



Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore

With miles of sandy beach bluffs rising 140 metres above Lake Michigan, the park boasts outstanding natural features, including forests, beaches, dunes, and ancient glacial phenomena. Cultural highlights include an 1871 lighthouse, three former Life-Saving Service/Coast Guard Stations, and a historic farm district.



Pictured Rocks National Lakeshore

One of only four National Lakeshores, this protected area of Lake Superior features miles of stunning beaches, sand dunes, waterfalls, and lighthouses. Its name derives from the colourful mineral streaks on the cliffs and it is one of the best places for ice climbing.

M innesota's outdoors offer a captivating blend of natural beauty and diverse landscapes that beckon adventurers year-round. Known as the Land of 10,000 Lakes, Minnesota boasts a plethora of pristine water bodies that are ideal for fishing, boating, and water sports during the warmer months. The Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness, a vast network of lakes and streams bordered by the Superior National Forest, offers unparalleled opportunities for canoeing, kayaking, and camping amidst untouched wilderness.

The North Shore of Lake Superior, with its rugged cliffs and picturesque waterfalls like Gooseberry Falls and historic sites like Split Rock Lighthouse, attracts hikers and photographers alike. Minnesota is adorned with forests, rolling hills, and expansive prairies, making it a haven for nature enthusiasts. The state's extensive network of trails and parks, including Itasca State Park, where the Mississippi River begins, ensures there's always a new corner of nature to explore.

Whether you seek tranquillity in nature's embrace or thrilling adventures in the wild, Minnesota's outdoors promise unforgettable experiences for all who venture into its natural splendour.



Mall of America® – The largest shopping and entertainment complex in the United States and one of the most visited tourist attractions on the globe, Mall of America® is just 15 minutes from downtown Minneapolis and boasts a whopping 500+ stores, 60 restaurants, amusement park and a plethora of other family-friendly entertainment.

Paisley Park – The former home and studio of musical superstar Prince, Paisley Park attracts visitors from around the world for tours, events, and concerts.

Mississippi River – People from around the world visit Itasca State Park in northwest Minnesota to marvel at the serene birthplace of the mighty Mississippi River. They pose next to a large pine log carved with yellow letters marking the beginning of the "Father of Waters," the second-longest river in the U.S. and the fourth-longest in the world.

Pipestone National Monument – For centuries, American Indians have visited the pipestone quarries to acquire red pipestone for crafting sacred ceremonial pipe bowls. Visitors can tour the Indigenous centre to learn about its origins and history, visit the gift shop, and catch a carving demonstration.

Split Rock Lighthouse – Once deemed the most dangerous stretch of water in the world, the lighthouse was constructed after a 1905 storm damaged 29 ships. It oversaw the safe passage of freight travellers for over half a century and today stands as an iconic landmark for visitors.

Stone Arch Bridge – A National Civil Engineering Landmark in Minneapolis, the Stone Arch Bridge is a former railway bridge that crosses the Mississippi River, offering breathtaking skyline views and a panoramic view of St. Anthony Falls. For an up-close look, head to the footpaths at Father Hennepin Bluff Park.

Push Your Boundaries

National Geographic Traveler called the Boundary Waters Canoe Area Wilderness, "50 Places of a Lifetime." A paddler's dream that should be on any adventure bucket list, more than 1,500 canoe routes are spread across 150 miles and over 1,000 lakes, rivers and streams along a remote stretch of the U.S./Canadian border.



Rock Yourself to Sleep

Floating fun, houseboats are a way of life up North and one of the best ways to tour Voyageurs National Park. Whether you stay a few days or a week, they're also popular to rent around Lake Vermilion, Birch Lake, and Leech Lake as an alternative to traditional cabins.



Hook, Line and Sinker

The largest freshwater lake in the world, fishing on Lake Superior makes it easy to cast a line. Anglers can fish from shore or boat, with many species of trout, salmon, and more available year-round.



When you're ready to stretch your legs, New York offers 2,000 miles of hiking and biking trails across the state. Notable destinations include the 6.2 million-acre Adirondack Park, the largest park outside of Alaska; Chimney Bluffs State Park, known for its dramatic landscapes shaped by ancient glaciers; the Natural Stone Bridge, home to the largest marble cave in the eastern United States; and Allegany State Park, a must-see for stunning fall colours.


Niagara Falls State Park – Niagara Falls is America's first state park, and features three impressive waterfalls. Experience the exhilarating spray up close on the Maid of the Mist boat tour, tour by trolley, or admire the falls illuminated in a spectrum of colours after dark.

Buffalo – Named one of the five most remarkable waterfronts in the US by *Hemispheres* magazine, there are countless ways to explore the recently redeveloped harbour from Canalside to marina with cruises and water bikes before taking in the iconic architecture, art museums and murals, and fun foods like the Buffalo Wing Trail.

Chautauqua-Allegheny – In the southwest corner of the state, enjoy trophy fishing on Lake Erie, biking in Allegany State Park, and scenic trails through Lake Erie Wine Country and Amish farmland. This area offers diverse attractions, including golf courses, amusement parks, aerial courses, and rafting adventures.

Hudson Valley – Experience stunning views from the Walkway Over the Hudson, the world's longest pedestrian bridge, or the Shawangunk Mountains Scenic Byway. The Shawangunk Ridge, known as "the Gunks," is a major rock climbing destination. Visit Innisfree Garden, one of the world's top ten gardens, climb Breakneck Ridge in Hudson Highlands State Park, or explore by kayak or canoe in a region touted as one of the world's top 20 destinations by *National Geographic Traveler*.

Follow the Ohio Historical Underground Railroad Trail back in time or explore Wine Country for a taste of local flavour.




More than half of the state is covered in forests, and despite lacking a coastline, Pennsylvania boasts 140 miles of waterfront along Lake Erie and the Delaware River. Erie is Pennsylvania's only port on the Great Lakes on beautiful Presque Isle Bay, which was recently named "Best Lake" and "Best Lake for Water Sports" by USA Today.

Presque Isle – The gateway to the Great Lakes, this national natural landmark boasts seven miles of idyllic beaches, and the only surf swimming you'll find within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The lagoons are perfect for paddlers, and nearby you'll find the start of the largest grape-growing region east of the Rocky Mountains!

Elk Country – Home to the largest wild elk herd in the northeastern US, with up to 1,400 elk freely roaming across a 127-mile drive loop through five counties. Don't miss the Bucktail Overlook, known locally as the "Top of the World." Pro Tip: The Elk Expo, held annually in August, draws hundreds of spectators and visitors for the live license drawing.

Kinzua Bridge State Park – Named "one of the world's most beautiful skywalks and viewpoints," by Culture Trip U.K., the Kinzua Bridge skywalk is an engineering marvel made out of a converted railway track that offers stunning views of the Pennsylvania Wilds. A partial glass floor provides an unparalleled look at the landscape below.





Allegheny National Forest – Pennsylvania's only national forest dominates the western part of the state, containing many of the region's most treasured places and experiences, from the Longhouse National Scenic Byway to the Allegheny Reservoir, Allegheny River, Kinzua Dam and Bridge State Park, ATV trails, and even a free light show from Mother Nature during Pennsylvania's synchronous firefly season.

Cook Forest and the Ancients – Known as a land of giants, this "forest cathedral" of ancient pines is a tribute to the majesty of the Pennsylvania Wilds. Home to many of the tallest trees in the Northeast, it's truly a fairytale come to life.

Seeing Stars – Dark Skies is home to the world's second certified International Dark-Sky Park. Cherry Springs State Park is renowned as one of the best stargazing and astronomy spots in the USA. On a clear night, up to 30,000 stars fill the sky, and lucky guests may also spot asteroids, Venus, the Northern Lights, and the Milky Way.

Rush the Rapids

The gateway to the Laurel Highlands, the "Yough" (pronounced yawk) River offers some of the best whitewater rafting in the eastern US. Ohiopyle State Park is home to the deepest gorge in the state and scenic waterfalls, with outfitters providing class 1-V rapid trips for everything from a relaxing day on the water to an extreme paddling adventure.



Hit the Trails

The Great Allegheny Passage boasts 150 miles of continuous hiking and biking trails. 

Wisconsin State Capitol – Admire the beautiful mosaics and towering marble columns of the State Capitol in Madison. Daily free tours are available, and in summer, the sixth-floor museum and observation deck are open to visitors.

Get Cheesy – Wisconsin is the only place outside Europe where one can earn a Master Cheesemaker certification, an advanced three-year degree in cheesemaking. Currently, there are nearly 80 Master Cheesemakers in the state, with more joining this elite group each year.

America's First Designated Tribal National Park – Frog Bay Tribal National Park is 180 pristine acres with views of 5 Apostle Islands from the sandy beach along Lake Superior. Managed by Red Cliff's Treaty Natural Resources Division, the park is open to the peaceful enjoyment of all.





With an abundance of green spaces, trails, and recreational facilities, Detroit is a haven for outdoor enthusiasts in an urban setting. The RiverWalk spans 5.5 miles and connects several parks to Belle Isle Park, a 982-acre island park featuring a conservatory, aquarium, and scenic views, while the Detroit River provides ample opportunities for kayaking, paddleboarding, riverboat cruises, and fishing. Get your bearings at Campus Martius Park, named the No. 1 "Top Public Square" in the U.S., tour Eastern Market, the country's oldest open-air market, meander the art of the City of Murals, or walk on the wild side at the Detroit River International Wildlife Refuge.



Visit Erie, Pennsylvania

The only location in Pennsylvania with access to the Great Lakes, Erie boasts a wealth of year-round recreation opportunities from downhill skiing in winter (yes, in the Midwest!) and beach lazing in summer. Erie's top attraction, Presque Isle State Park, is a National Natural Landmark that arches into Lake Erie, forming the calm waters of Presque Isle Bay. Free to enter, find seven miles of sandy shores, miles of flat trails favoured by runners, hikers and bicyclists, easy access to some of the most productive fishing on the Great Lakes, and watersport rentals.



Visit Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania

With 90 distinct neighbourhoods and breathtaking views from every angle, there are endless opportunities for outdoor adventure in Pittsburgh. One of the best ways to explore is to hit the streets and simply to get lost in the right direction. Pittsburgh is incredibly walkable and bikeable thanks to accessible hotels and public transportation, an easy-to-use bikeshare system, and a devoted community of cyclists. When you're ready to cool off, the city's renowned three rivers offer a wealth of watersports, including boating, kayaking, and paddleboarding.



Visit Milwaukee, Wisconsin

At the confluence of three rivers, Milwaukee is truly a great city on a Great Lake, the perfect backdrop for watery activities like guided sails, fishing, freshwater surfing, kayaking, and an endless array of aquatic pursuits. Soak up the sun, go with the flow, or make waves on the numerous waterways that traverse this freshwater hub. Work up a sweat cycling, rollerblading, walking, or birdwatching along the 135-mile Oak Leaf Trail. Or cool off with a sightseeing boat cruise, stroll along the RiverWalk—a 3.1-mile accessible pathway winding through downtown—or paddle up to the docks of Lakefront Brewery.
